Business of the Month: Danielles Chocolate

Frawnda LeCheminant's family has been in the candy-making business for 43 years last month. Frawnda's mother's family were candy makers in England.

Danielle's Chocolates was established in 1980 in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, by Frawnda's father and mother, Calvin



and Joyce Lee. Calvin, age 87, is still involved, along with Danielle Atkinson and her husband, Scott. Danielle and Scott make the popcorn while Calvin and daughter-in-law Jenna LeCheminant make the chocolates. Three daughters in the area, along with her son, step in and help as needed.

They moved their business to Las Vegas, NV in 1987 because of the economic conditions in northern Idaho. In 2003, a customer suggested they check out Mesquite, and here is where they decided to stay.

In 1995, they added Snowy Popcorn, and Frawnda says, "It is the 'backbone' of the business, but chocolate is the 'heart' of the business." They went from ordering 50 lbs. of white chocolate annually to 60,000 lbs. (yes, those numbers are correct!) for the production of their Snowy Popcorn. Their main source of revenue is from the popcorn, but quality is their #1 goal.

In 2004, they moved into a larger production facility in Mesquite, Nevada. Then, busting out of the seams at their then current space on Pioneer, they sought out a location that would provide them room to expand, eventually landing at 1155 W. Pioneer Blvd., Suite 102 (the old Nevada Bank & Trust Bldg.)

Their biggest challenge is training, taking a minimum of two years to learn proper dipping.

Frawnda attributes their success to a fabulous community and great customers. They offer everything from dark to milk chocolates, nuts and clusters, creams, tortoises, chews, and sugar-free items, in which to make a basket or bag to your liking.

In the Spotlight: Bob & Aarela Webster

Bob and Aarela Webster were both working in Trinidad, Colorado. Here they met and married on September 10, 2001. Bob and Aarela spent three years in Trinidad making glass pieces to attach to the car.

Bob was born in Binghamton NY and was a wrestling champion. He went to the University of Connecticut (UCONN) studying Engineering. His education was disillusioning, so he joined the Coast Guard. His first marriage gave him 2 boys who are successful in Connecticut.



Bob returned to UCONN and became a mechanic, did purchasing and designed a reversible turbine. When he moved to Trinidad, the city of Trinidad was looking to increase tourism so Bob and Aarela started an Art Car Parade. It began with 25 cars and grew to 100. Because of their joint interest in creating an Art Car, they began to work on the 1990 Isuzu that Bob's boss gave him. Soon, the amazing glass car took shape.

Bob and Aarela were looking to get away from the cold in Colorado and when they came to Mesquite, they decided to move here.

Aarela was a Colorado native. She was a sickly child from a big family. She loved what her dad's dad did as a craftsman. She went to the University of Denver. As a Single Mom she raised 2 daughters and 1 son. Her interest in Stained Glass helped her get a Glass Artist fellowship. She had a yearly show at the Denver Botanic Gardens. Her interest in Metaphysics inspired her to create glass artworks that dealt with the fundamental nature of reality. She is now a retired teacher and mentors her fellow Stained Glass Club members. She loves to go on cruises where they have art auctions. She has filled her home with glass and paintings.





The Ingredients

13 ¼ oz Puff Pastry 17 ¾ oz Pork Sausage Meat 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon 3 teaspoons ground cloves 3 teaspoons ground ginger 1 Egg

Instructions

- 1. Take the puff pastry out of the fridge about 20 minutes to half an hour before you want to start. This helps it soften up and makes it easier to roll out.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 200°C fan / 400°F
- 3. Line 2 baking trays with greaseproof paper / baking parchment.
- 4. Add a little all-purpose (plain flour) to your worktop and roll out the 375g of Puff Pastry (try to keep it rectangular) or unroll a sheet of ready-rolled puff pastry.
- 5. Cut the pastry sheets into 3 equal pieces.
- 6. Sprinkle over 1 teaspoon of ground cinnamon, 1 teaspoon of ground cloves and 1 teaspoon of ground ginger to the centre of each of the cut pieces of puff pastry.
- 7. Add the 500g of sausage meat into a bowl, divide into 3 and using your hands form into thin sausages and place them the length of each piece of puff pastry.
- 8. Beat 1 egg in a small bowl and use a pastry brush to brush over the pastry.
- 9. Paint a line of egg brush along one edge and roll the sausage meat up (from the non-brushed side) in the pastry and place them seam side down (this will help stop them from unravelling in the oven).
- 10. Gently score the top of the sausage roll.
- 11. Use a knife and cut them into bitesize pieces. I tend to cut them into 8 pieces each but you can make them smaller. Place them on the prepared baking tray. Leave a gap between them so they can expand up in the oven.




Sun City Residents who Rock! Steve Mowad

Gardening - Poinsettia

The poinsettia is a well-known member of the spurge family (Euphorbiaceae). They are a popular holiday plant because of their colorful bracts (leaves). The poinsettia is named for Joel R. Poinsett who introduced it to floriculture while he was the United States minister to Mexico in the late 1820s. He discovered the flowers growing on a hillside in Taxco, Mexico. He sent some plants home to South Carolina, and they grew very well in a greenhouse. Now 90 percent of poinsettias are exported from the United States.

There are many cultivated varieties. The colors can range from creamy white to pink, as well as patterns of green and white. Blue and purple are

unusual colors that may be found in speciality garden centers or on-line. However, the Poinsettias in solid red or shades of red are in high demand during the Christmas season.

Poinsettias change color and bloom when the winter days get shorter. They will grow the best in moist soil and temperatures between 65 and 70 degrees Fahrenheit. They are not poisonous, but the sap may cause a skin rash. It is best to wear gloves when caring for these plants.

A common question after the holiday decorations are boxed up, "How can I make my poinsettia rebloom?" The an-

swer, it is not an easy task. It requires keeping the plant in the dark for a period of time, fertilizing, pruning, transplanting and following a watering schedule.

Poinsettias are an attractive green plant and can be kept as a houseplant. So, whether it is a plant for all year or just at the holiday, enjoy your poinsettia.

National Poinsettia Day is celebrated on December 12.


At an average of five inches tall, the pint-size Elf Owl is the world's smallest raptor.

In Nevada, Elf Owls prefer a desert habitat near arroyos with giant cactus, willows and mesquite trees.

They nest in cavities in flower stalks of agave and yucca, or in old woodpecker holes to get relief from heat and protection from predators.

Many raptors hunt and catch snakes for food, but Elf Owls use a different approach. They catch thread snakes (also known as slender blind snakes) and

bring them back to their nest alive so the snakes can eat harmful parasites that might be in their nests.



Elf Owls are agile and acrobatic when foraging. They capture insects in flight or pluck them from the ground. With powerful vision and acute hearing, Elf Owls can hunt from low perches and are sensitive to the slightest sound or movement when capturing prey. They also chase insects on foot and can hang upside down from foliage to dislodge prey.

The Elf Owl is quiet during the day and most active at night. During the nesting season, Elf Owl pairs forage over small areas from one to six acres. These owls are monogamous. Their eggs hatch in about 24 days, and hatchlings are covered in soft white down.

Habitat loss due to agriculture, grazing, mining and development has reduced Elf Owl populations; however, there is not yet a significant concern of population decline.

The oldest known wild Elf Owl lived to about six years old.
