Davis and was named after his dog, Wolf. The Wolf Brand Chili label still has a picture of a wolf to this day. Of course, the biggest decision is beans or no beans!

Mesquite Trails RV Resort, our community's newest RV park, welcomed its first guest on July 18. Since then, both overnight and extended stay visitors from across the country have taken advantage of the beautiful campground facilities and its proximity to all the great activities Mesquite and surrounding areas offer.

The park is a perfect place to suggest to friends or family members who may be traveling to Mesquite by RV. It is just under three miles from the Sun City Mesquite Pioneer Center and is located at 1225 W. Hafen Lane, right off the northbound US 15, Exit 120. The facility has 193 full hookup sites and offers current amenities such as a community room, free WI-FI, laundry facilities, showers, and both a dog park and dog wash area.

In 2024, the park will add pickleball courts, a swimming pool, and an event center that will be open to RVers and their guests. Various reasonable pricing structures are available for day, group, tournament, and 30-day visitors. Additional discounts are available through various partner organizations such as Good Sam and for military, veterans, first responders and K-12 educators. Several spots are also available for off-season storage.

Managers Missy and Dave Schlotfeldt want to make all their guests feel welcome by "building a sense of community while they are with us." They hosted a Thanksgiving potluck dinner and found that their greatest joy "is when we see people out and having fun." The Ingredients

pound lean ground beef
Tbsp olive oil
medium onion, finely diced
red bell pepper, diced
green bell pepper, diced
garlic cloves, minced
Tbsp Taco Seasoning, or 1 packet of store-bought taco seasoning
oz can beans, drained (kidney or pinto)
cup corn, canned, fresh or frozen
1/2 cups tomatoes, diced, from about
lb fresh tomatoes

2 cups beef broth

Instructions

In a Dutch oven, heat oil. Once hot, add the ground beef, onion, and bell peppers and sauté until the beef is browned, breaking it up with a spatula as you cook. Spoon out any excess fat.

Add garlic and 1 packet of Taco Seasoning, and stir for another minute.

Add beans, corn, tomatoes and broth. Bring to a boil then reduce the heat to low, cover, and keep at a simmer for for 15 minutes. Season to taste with salt and pepper to taste, or add more taco seasoning.

Serve soup hot with your desired toppings.

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Home Means Nevada

"Home Means Nevada" is not just a slogan, it is the state song. It was written in 1932 by Bertha Raffetto and adopted by the state legislature in 1933.

Currently "Home Means Nevada" is found on Nevada license plates and used in art, business, and government.

Nevada is home to 3.144 million people according to the 2021 census, making it the nineteenth least populous state.

The state of Nevada is located in the western region of the United States. Nevada covers an area of approximately 110,567 square miles (the seventh largest state). The states of Idaho, Oregon, Utah, California, and Arizona share a border. Carson City is the state capital. The Colorado and Humboldt are important rivers. Lake Mead and Lake Tahoe are major recreation areas.



Nevada has three very distinct geographical regions; the Sierra Nevada mountain range, The Great Basin, and the Mojave Desert.

The Sierra Nevada has many rugged peaks and deep canyons formed from glaciers and erosion. Boundary Peak at 13,147 feet is the highest point in Nevada. The literal translation of Sierra Nevada is snowy mountains.

The Great Basin is comprised of high desert, rugged mountains and many basins and valleys. The most well know ba-



sin is Death Valley at 282 feet below sea level. Death Valley has recorded the hottest temperature of 134.1 degrees in July 1913.

The Mojave Desert's topography can vary greatly from one location to another. There can be rocky cliffs, sandy dunes, and dry lake beds. It is also the home to Las Vegas, the largest city in Nevada and the 28th most populous city in the United States. Las Vegas is sometimes referred to as the ninth island because it is home to one of the largest populations of Native Hawaiians outside of Hawaii.

This is home, this is Nevada.

Critter Corner: Chuckwalla (genus Sauromalus)

The chuckwalla is one of the larger lizards making their home in Southern Nevada.

They can grow up to nine inches long and appear to be quite fat. However, chuckwallas have a lot of loose skin around their neck, shoulders and stomachs, which allow them to expand their body size when threatened.

They can slip into a rock crevice and inflate their lungs, making it extremely difficult for predators to grab hold and get them out. Known predators are coyotes, rattlesnakes and some raptors. Chuckwallas can also be adversely affected by parasites or mites.

Chuckwallas prefer scrubby desert areas with rocky hiding places. They like to spend their days alternating between basking on rocks in the sun and resting in the shade to regulate their body tempera-



ture. They have been known to hibernate in crevices and underground burrows during winter.

Chuckwallas are primarily herbivores and eat leaves and fruits from various plants. They prefer flowerheads and moist leaves and get most of the water they need from their diet.

A chuckwalla's color depends on its location, mood, surroundings and temperature. Their tails are often a lighter shade than their body color.

Chuckwallas usually breed during the summer. The eggs are incubated in an underground nest until they hatch – around 35 days.

The hatchlings are immediately independent. The chuckwalla mother does not provide any type of care. Less than 40 percent of chuckwallas make it through their first year. After that risky first year, they are much more likely to survive.

In the wild, chuckwallas usually live to 15 years old but have been known to live 30 years. In captivity, they can live up to 65 years.

Nevada is the only state that allows breeding of chuckwallas, and some people keep them as pets.

Mesquite Hot Air Balloon Festival

You also don't want to miss January's next spectacular event in Mesquite, the Hot Air Balloon Festival. This annual event which began in 2012, will typically attract three dozen balloonists and thousands of viewers to see this spectacular display of balloons soaring into the Nevada skies.

The festival is scheduled to take place from January 26 - January 28, 2024. Weather permitting, the balloon launch will begin around 7:30 a.m. Saturday and Sunday. A crowd favorite takes place in the Casa Blanca parking area with a Night Glow Candlestick show on Friday and Saturday evenings. After the Night Glow, event goers may also enjoy live entertainment at the Skydome Lounge.

Both of these colorful and exciting events are free for viewing. See you there!!
