Gardening: That's Just Peachy



National Peach Month is celebrated every August. This fuzzy, stone fruit provides a bounty of sweet deliciousness all summer long. It is really hard to imagine June, July, or August without eating a tree-ripe peach.

Peaches date

back to Ancient China and were domesticated by the Chinese. They became a luxury food and were highly traded on the Silk Road. Peaches spread to the Persian Empire with the Romans calling it a Persian Apple. Much thanks goes to Alexander the Great for Europe's first taste of a peach. By the 1500's, the Spanish Explorers introduced it to America and Georgia planted its first peach tree in the 1600's.

The peach industry booms in the 1900's with hundreds of varieties of peaches, including nectarines in the United States and 2,000 varieties worldwide. The nectarine is a variant of a peach and not a cross between a peach and a plum. The only difference between a peach and a nectarine is their skin texture. The fruit is a drupe. It will have a "hard stone" in the center thus dividing peaches into two types: clingstone or freestone. A clingstone peach will have its flesh cling to the stone while a freestone's flesh will freely come away.

Georgia is known as the peach state, but it is California that leads the nation in peach production. South Carolina, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Washington have grown a lot of peaches as well. It will take a peach tree two to four years to begin to bear fruit. The best fruit is the one that is allowed to ripen on the tree. Your taste buds will thank you.

Peach Caprese Salad



Ingredients

2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

1 tablespoon balsamic vinegar

1 teaspoon flaked salt, divided

2 large heirloom tomatoes, thinly sliced

2 ripe peaches - halved, pitted, and sliced into half moons

1 (8 ounce) ball fresh mozzarella, thinly sliced

6 leaves fresh basil

Directions

Whisk together olive oil, balsamic vinegar, and 1 pinch flaked salt in a small bowl until dressing is smooth.

Alternate tomato slices, peach slices, mozzarella slices, and basil leaves in layers on a serving platter. Drizzle dressing over salad and sprinkle remaining flaked salt on top.

Sun City Clubs: Hearts and Spades



Fun out of the Sun

Temperatures might be high outside, but members of the Sun City Mesquite (SCM) Hearts Club and the Spades Club are staying cool while meeting to play at the Pioneer Center. “And, we are having fun, fun, fun,” says Steve Hermie, who presides as President for both Clubs.

These clubs are just two of several card clubs offered to SCM residents. The Spades Club is the older of the two, having started in 2019. The game itself originated in the late 1930s and its popularity quickly spread as soldiers deployed during WWII played the game across the globe. Spades is a partner game, with each partner bidding on the number of tricks the team will pick up in each round. The closer the team is to accurately bidding

the number of tricks, the better the score for the team. For example, if the team’s total bid was six and they picked up six tricks, each trick is worth 10 points. Underestimation of the number of total tricks allows for only one point per extra trick. For example, if the team bid six but picked up seven tricks, their score would be 60 for the first six tricks plus one point for the extra for a total score of 61 for the round. The game is generally played to 250 points.

While the SCM Hearts Club is only six weeks old, the game itself emerged in America in the 1880s. It is an individual game with the aim of holding no hearts or the Queen of Spades in a player’s hand at the end of a round. Players will receive one point for each heart they do hold and 13 points if they hold the Queen of Spades. At the end of the game, the player with the lowest number of points is the winner. Membership in both clubs is growing and Hermie is looking forward to getting more people involved as snowbirds return this fall. “It is a great way to get to know neighbors and have fun in a non-competitive way.” New players can receive coaching to learn how to play and are always welcome.

Both Clubs meet at 1:30 p.m. but on different days. The Spades Club meets on Thursdays in the Loft and the Hearts Club meets on Mondays in the Veteran’s Memorial Hall.

Business Corner: Donkey Dreams Sanctuary

Donkey Dreams Sanctuary (“DDS”) is a non-profit established in 2022 by Amber Raleigh and her husband, Edj Fish. They used to work with wild Mustangs and saw a need to rescue donkeys and give them quality of life with a forever home.

DDS is not to be confused with the Donkey Museum, which is the Peaceful Valley Donkey Rescue. That organization rescues donkeys from Death Valley and rehomes their donkeys, whereas DDS takes in rescues where they live out their lives at DDS.

The donkey is part of the equine family (horses and zebras) with large ears. The mule, however, is a cross between a male donkey and a female horse. A donkey in the wild is a burro. DDS has wild and domesticated donkeys. A male donkey is called a Jack and a female donkey called a Jenny.

Their 10-acre spread in Scenic, AZ is home to over 50 donkeys, part of five donkey families and includes seniors, and some with special needs. DDS has rescued donkeys as far east as Texas and as far west as Death Valley National Park. Recently, they rescued 16 moms and babies that were destined for a Mexican slaughterhouse. Two of the moms were pregnant and recently gave birth in late May and late June (see pics).

When donkeys are brought to the DDS, they can live out the rest of their life as they were accustomed. Their donkeys range in age from a couple of days old to 36 years of age. Donkeys can live up to 50 years.

Critter Corner: Pygmy Rabbit (*Brachylagus idahoensis*)

Pygmy rabbits are the only rabbits in Nevada that dig their burrows. Occasionally, they use dens made by other animals. These tiny rabbits are usually found in areas with tall, dense sagebrush and typically dig their burrows in deep soil near a water source.

Pygmy rabbits have short ears, small hind legs and dusky gray bodies. As herbivores, they depend on sagebrush for food and to provide protection from predators. They live from three to five years and weigh only one pound.

Pygmy rabbits are social animals and do not hibernate. They may be active at any time of day but are most active at dusk and dawn. They typically move by scampering close to the ground and rarely leap or hop like other rabbits. Their field of vision encompasses nearly 360 degrees, and they have just a small blind spot at the bridge of their nose due to the unique positioning of their eyes in their skulls.

These rabbits, facing numerous challenges, are incredibly careful and never venture more than 60 feet from their burrows. Their main threats are habitat loss, severe weather, road mortality and predators. They stay even closer to their burrows during the winter for safety. Their best defense is to quickly evade any predators.

Pygmy rabbits are a species found in north-central Nevada on the JD Ranch. Conservation easements held by Nevada Land Trust protect them. According to the Nevada Department of Wildlife, Nevada has worked with Washington state to help reestablish and preserve their endangered populations of pygmy rabbits. Nevada has also provided rabbits for relocation to increase the overall population of pygmy rabbits in the Washington Columbia Basin.

Water is the most critical resource for Sun City and Mesquite. Both rely on deep wells drilled into the aquifer below. Fortunately, the area does not depend on Colorado River Water. The state of Nevada has allocated 12,271 AFY (acre-feet/year), or nearly four billion gallons per year to be used in our area. Currently, 6,900 of the 12,271 AFY are being pumped and used. The groundwater below us is mainly replenished by the precipitation received in the mountains to the north, east, and south of Mesquite. So, the question might be: When will the water usage in the area reach the 12,271 AFY and then what?

The Virgin Valley Water District (VVWD) updates its Water Master Plan (Plan) every three years. The last update occurred in August 2023 and can be found on their web site at: vvwdnv.com under "Our Water" and drop down to "Reports and Studies." In the VVWD's 2020 plan, it was estimated the 12,271 AFY would be reached in 2034. In the latest plan, the 12,271 AFY is expected to be reached in 2040, six years longer, which is excellent news!

Not so fast with the excitement – First of all, why did the Plan get better in three years, and what do we do for more water when our 12,271 AFY in Basin 222 runs out? Come to Pioneer Center on Monday, Aug 5 for the presentation by the VVWD GM and Conservation Specialist at 9 a.m. for the answers to these and other questions.
