Mesquite Gets Its First Torah

Our delightful Rabbi Zuckerman (Zucky) has decided to bring a Torah to Mesquite. For the first time in history our town finally gets the five books of Moses (The Torah) handwritten on parchment (animal hide) by a licensed Scribe. It often takes the Scribe up to a year to write and can cost up to \$40,000 dollars depending on design and special types of scrolls. The Torah must be written using a quill pen and rare vegetable ink.

At one time a Torah in San Diego from the Czech Republic that survived the Holocaust had the ink eaten by bacteria. It had to be repaired at a cost of \$7,000.00. While in Portland, Zucky had a Russian Torah that was hidden for 70 years to prevent its destruction by Nazis and later by communists. That scroll was sold to a young congregation in upstate New York.

During the current war, Zucky visited Israel three times to bring/ buy supplies for soldiers. On his first trip back in November of 2023, he attended the funeral for Rose Ida Lubin, a 20-year girl from Atlanta who moved to Israel after high school. She joined the Israeli Border Patrol and on October 7 fought back against the terrorists on the kibbutz she was living. Not a single person on that kibbutz was killed. Weeks later while on patrol in East Jerusalem a 16-year-old Arab stabbed her.



Zucky is hoping to have another Torah cover made in Rose's memory. He has brought the Torah here to help him educate people about Jewish traditions in local institutions. Zucky often has presentations that show some of the life of people in Israel and their struggles and successes.

Zucky and his wife Simi have been living in Mesquite for going on nine years. He would like to give a special thanks to TJ Custom Mats and Frames for taking the crate the Torah was shipped in and making it into an Ark. Further special thanks go to Steve Gantman for hosting the Torah at his home.

Ingredients

8 oz corned beef 8 oz full-fat cream cheese, room temperature 1 cup shredded Swiss cheese ½ cup sauerkraut ¼ cup Thousand Island Dressing ¼ cup sour cream ¼ tsp garlic powder

Oven Directions

Pre-heat the oven to 400°F. Add the corned beef, sauerkraut, Swiss cheese, cream cheese, sour cream, salad dressing, and garlic powder to a medium mixing bowl and stir well to combine. Transfer the mixture to an 8"x8" baking dish and use a spatula to evenly spread. Bake for 15-20 minutes until bubbly

and hot. Optional – Broil for 5 minutes to

brown the top of the dip.

Crockpot Directions

Throw everything in the crockpot and cook on low for 4-6 hours or high for 2-3 hours.

Dipper Ideas

Serve with rye bread, rye crackers, Triscuits, pita bread or your favorite crackers.

Sun City Clubs: Cribbage Club

The game of cribbage has its origins in England about 1630 and is credited to John Suckling for its invention or adaptation of Noddy. He added a discard pile which is now called the "crib." He also gifted decks of cards to British nobility and then played against them for money and won because the decks were marked! Even though he was dishonest, he was knighted because of the popularity of cribbage and became Sir John Suckling and was a member of Parliament. Because of his dishonesty in politics, he was later exiled to France where he died at the age of 33, probably of suicide.

A "perfect" Cribbage hand of 29 points consists of a Jack and four fives. This "perfect" hand can happen once is



216,000 hands, so most players have never had one. If this doesn't make sense, or if it sounds interesting, come join the Cribbage Club that meets



in the Pioneer Center each Thursday from 10:00 to noon.

If you don't know how, or if you have forgotten how to play, someone will teach you, and there are NO DUES! The club is always looking for new members or visitors. However, to learn how to play the game, it's best to just start playing rather than watching. Many teachers of cribbage will deal all cards face up while you learn the strategies of play. Cribbage is often played with two, three or four players, so you'll easily fit in.

Critter Corner: Discovering Palmer's Chipmunk: Nevada's Hidden Treasure

Tucked away in the Spring Mountains of the Great Basin, Palmer's Chipmunk (Tamias palmeri) is a tiny but remarkable rodent contributing to Nevada's unique ecosystem.

Unlike its more common chipmunk cousins, this elusive species is found only in Nevada--a true Nevada original.

Palmer's Chipmunk thrives in the rugged terrain of the Great Basin. Unlike chipmunks that prefer dense forests, this species lives in high-altitude scrublands and rocky outcrops, typically between 7,000 and 10,000 feet above sea level.

Despite its small size, Palmer's Chipmunks are important to the Nevada environment. As they scurry through their habitat, they serve as a natural seed disperser, aiding in plant regeneration. Their burrowing activities also help aerate the soil, promoting healthier vegetation



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growth. Without creatures like Palmer's Chipmunk, these fragile high-altitude ecosystems would struggle to sustain their diverse plant life.

Palmer's Chipmunk is as striking as it is resourceful. With bold black and white stripes running along its back, its fur provides more than just eye-catching beauty--it offers essential camouflage against predators such as hawks, snakes, coyotes, raccoons and weasels.

Distinct from true hibernators, Palmer's Chipmunk enters a state of torpor (inactivity) during the colder months to help conserve energy and emerge during warmer days to forage. Chipmunks are typically ground dwellers, but this species is an excellent climber, scaling shrubs and trees to find food.

This species is classified as endangered by the International Union for the Conservation of Nature. Thus, its habitat is protected and managed by the U. S. Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management.

Spotting a Palmer's Chipmunk in the wild is a rare event since its territory is somewhat isolated. But do keep an eye out while exploring; you might just be lucky enough to catch a glimpse!

Talking to a loved one about their wishes for the end of life

How do you know when to to call Hospice?
