Mesquite Local History - The Visionary Behind the Dream - Who Was Del Webb?

The Delbert E. Webb (1899-1974) Legacy and Sun City

A three-part historical series exploring the fascinating story of Del Webb, Sun City's founder, and the man whose vision reshaped the style of retirement living.

Part One of Three

The Visionary Behind the Dream – Who Was Del Webb?

Del Webb had a bold vision and a knack for thinking big. Long before retirement

communities became a norm, Webb saw an opportunity. His opinion? "People weren't retiring from life, just retiring from work."

An avid baseball player, Webb grew up in California with dreams of going pro until a severe bout of typhoid fever in 1927 nearly killed him. Seeking a dry climate, he moved to the Phoenix area and began working as a carpenter. By 1928, he had started his own construction company with a single concrete mixer and a few shovels, wheelbarrows and picks.

His firm quickly grew, even at the height of the depression. During the 1930s and early 1940s, his company built many projects, including hospitals, ballparks, hotels and military facilities supporting World War II. A lifelong baseball player and fan, in 1945, Webb and a partner acquired the New York Yankees.

In the late 1940s, notorious mobster Bugsy Siegel hired Webb to finish building the Las Vegas Flamingo Hotel and Casino after blown budgets and schedule delays had plagued the project.

Bugsy was shot to death in 1947, most likely by his own associates, allegedly due to the project's cost overruns and his mob partners' suspicions of embezzlement. But Webb's successful completion of the Flamingo brought national attention and helped shape Las Vegas into the entertainment hub it is today.

Webb wasn't just interested in glitz and glamour; he had a far bigger idea.

In the post-war years, as America boomed and demographics shifted, Webb recognized retirees were living longer. Many sought purpose,



connection and activity
- not just rocking chairs.
Webb pictured building
resort-style living where
retirees could stay active
and enjoy a strong sense of
community.

Part Two continues with the grand opening of the first Sun City, sparking a national movement.

Quick and Easy Alfredo Sauce



Ingredients:

½ cup butter

1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese

2 teaspoons garlic powder

2 cups milk

6 ounces grated Parmesan cheese

1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper

Directions:

Gather all ingredients.

Melt butter in a medium, nonstick saucepan over medium heat. Add cream cheese and garlic powder, stirring with a wire whisk until smooth. Add milk, a little at a time, whisking to smooth out lumps. Stir in Parmesan cheese and pepper.

Remove from heat when sauce reaches desired consistency. Sauce will thicken rapidly. Thin with milk if cooked too long.

Toss with hot pasta to serve.

Sun City Clubs: The Bridge Club of Sun City: A Thriving Community

The Bridge Club is flourishing under the leadership of President Ken Womer, Vice President Loie Yester, and Secretary David Zehnder.

Bridge, a game renowned for its depth and complexity, isn't something one can master overnight. Recognizing this, the Bridge Club offers lessons every Tuesday from 10 a.m. to noon, gradually allowing anyone to become proficient in the game.

The club boasts a membership of around 50 individuals. The playing system encourages interaction and fairness: members are assigned randomly to four-person tables representing the cardinal directions - North, South, East, and West. North and South form a partnership to play against



East and West. After each game, a new set of players is randomly assigned, ensuring everyone can play with different partners.

There are two types of bridge games: Duplicate Bridge and Rubber Bridge. Duplicate Bridge, known for its relaxed atmosphere, allows players to choose their partners. In contrast, Rubber Bridge assigns partners, adding a different dynamic to the game.

The club maintains a balanced ratio of men and women, fostering an environment where the primary goals are socialization and enjoyment. A fee of \$5 is charged for membership.

Scores are tracked and displayed monthly, with the top yearly scorer receiving a small trophy. While the club is not affiliated with any official bridge association, it remains a haven for those who relish the camaraderie and challenge of the game.

To join, contact the front desk for information. Anyone with a knack for card games can learn bridge. Beginners are encouraged to attend the Tuesday classes.

Overall, the Sun City Bridge Club stands as a testament to the enduring appeal of bridge and the strong community bonds it fosters. With its welcoming atmosphere and structured approach to the game, the club continues to thrive and bring joy to its members.


Conestoga Golf Course

Critter Corner: Nevada's Silent Stalkers – The Secret Life of Bobcats

Nevada's vast deserts, rocky canyons and scrub-covered hills are home to one of the state's most elusive residents - the bobcat (Lynx rufus).

Though rarely seen, these wildcats thrive in the Silver State. About twice the size of a domestic cat, bobcats are instantly recognizable by their short "bobbed" tails, tufted ears and spotted coats that blend perfectly with the desert environment.

Bobcats are masters of stealth. Primarily nocturnal, they roam silently, searching for prey such as rabbits, birds, mice and reptiles. Bobcats are great climbers and often stash food high in trees. They can leap up to 12 feet in a single bound.

Despite their solitary lifestyle, bobcats communicate in many ways. They use scent markings, claw marks on trees, and even yowls echoing eerily through the desert at night.



Bobcats typically mate once a year, and the female carries her kittens for about 60 to 70 days before giving birth, usually in a hidden den made in a hollow tree or rock crevice. The mother raises her young kittens alone, teaching them to hunt and survive in the wild.

Bobcats are remarkably adaptable, unlike their lynx cousins, who prefer cold, snowy regions. They thrive in Nevada's dry heat and are equally at home in mountainous forests or arid lowlands. Their populations are stable due to their elusive behavior and secretive dens.

A bobcat's hearing is so acute it can detect the movement of prey beneath snow or brush. Combined with whiskers that sense air currents and vibrations, bobcats are silent, efficient hunters, even in total darkness.

Mysterious and impressive, bobcats are a fascinating symbol of the wild resilience in Nevada's natural landscapes. You may never see one, but a bobcat might be silently watching you from the nearest rocky outcrop.

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
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
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
